Reflection

"Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? (Luke 6:41) Wood has some very admirable qualities. Depending on the type of wood, you can build almost anything out of it. Wood can be used to make a house, start a fire, create furniture, or even create tools. Wood can also be used to burn someone at the stake, create hate signs and symbols, or even harm a variety of people as weapons, such as hanging a person on a cross. The item itself is not the problem, but the intention to use it, in this case, wood. In the gospel, Jesus uses the symbolism of wood in the image of splinters and beams. One reason could be that he would know the various casualties of working with wood since he was a carpenter. He would know how to refine and fortify the wood to strengthen it. Jesus would know how to use that wood to create art, and if he made an error in the design, he would know how to fix it. The problem with the judgment of the two brothers is not because they are judging but because both were blind and did not see the woundedness they both experienced with wood in their eyes. If we allow Jesus to remove the wood that blinds us, he can make beautiful creations out of it. It will be painful, especially during the time of Jesus; there was no anesthesia, pain medications, or even proper operation tables. However, we must trust that Jesus knows what he is doing to extract the wood and heal the wound; after all, he is the divine physician. As we progress through the week reflecting on our wounds from the wood that has embedded into our eyes, let us not make the mistake of performing surgery with unqualified and non-compassionate hands but allow the divine physician to properly extract and heal us so that we can see Jesus in our neighbor and bring others with similar wounds to the divine physician. Some questions to reflect on this week are:

- Have I allowed Jesus to operate and heal my wounds
 - o Do I assist in bringing the wounded to Jesus, the divine physician?
- Have I made matters worse in trying to help people with their own wooden beams in their eyes, that I
 have caused more damage in both my wounds and theirs?
 - o Am I humbling enough to know when to let go and let God?
- Am I that blind and ignorant to stay with the pain of the wood in my eye rather than suffer from the pain of the wood being taken out of my eye and being healed by the love and mercy of Jesus?

About The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC)

- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) adopted a "Joint Declaration on Unity" with the Roman Catholic Church through which both bodies agreed to a limited communion arrangement.

- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) permits <u>divorced people</u> to participate fully in the Mass and to receive the Eucharist. The church does not recognize civil divorce and requires an annulment before parishioners can remarry.

The legislative authority of the Church is vested in the General Synod, the Special Synod, the Diocesan Synod, and the Parish Meeting. In financial and administrative matters, the Parishioners possess administrative authority. Representatives elected at the Annual Parish Meeting and confirmed by the Diocesan Bishop exercise their constitutional authority.
