Reflection

Imagine trying to do the best you can at your work, family life, or school, and though challenging, you feel content with your work; but then comes someone else who does similar activities and with similar situations of life, and they make it look so easy. We feel disheartened, a failure; we question whether we were working hard in the first place or whether the things we have been doing are worth the energy. In the Gospel today, Jesus makes a note of these things, for he says: "Blessed are you who are poor..., Blessed are you who are now hungry..., Blessed are you who are now weeping..., Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man." (Luke 6:20-22) In other words, "Blessed are you who are struggling at this moment and who feel helpless." Why does Jesus praise those who are suffering and persecuted now? He connects our present suffering with his [future] suffering on the cross and enthusiastically says, "Rejoice and leap for joy on that day! Behold, your reward will be great in heaven." (Luke 6:23) He also warns those who do the opposite, "But woe to you who are rich...Woe to you who are filled now...Woe to you who laugh now...Woe to you when all speak well of you" (Luke 6:24-26). Seeing the light when persecuted or suffering in our present circumstances may be difficult. Still, in our trust in Jesus, we have hope that through these struggles, we will receive graces imaginable in the life to come and peace when we connect our present struggles and sufferings to our Lord. Some questions to reflect on this week:

- How am I connecting my present sufferings, hurts, wounds, and crosses to Jesus
 - Do I trust in his words that we will be rewarded through our sufferings?
- How do I help others in their sufferings
 - Am I a cross to others, or do I contribute to their suffering?

About The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC)

- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) adopted a "Joint Declaration on Unity" with the Roman Catholic Church through which both bodies agreed to a limited communion arrangement.
 We are in Dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church
- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) permits <u>divorced</u> <u>people</u> to participate fully in the Mass and to receive the Eucharist. The church does not recognize civil divorce and requires an annulment before parishioners can remarry.
- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) is governed by its Constitution and Laws. The legislative authority of the Church is vested in the General Synod, the Special Synod, the Diocesan Synod, and the Parish Meeting. In financial and administrative matters, the Parishioners possess administrative authority. Representatives elected at the Annual Parish Meeting and confirmed by the Diocesan Bishop exercise their constitutional authority.
 - The hierarchy is as follows:
 - Prime Bishop: Rt. Rev. Anthony Mikovsky Diocesan Bishop of the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese: Rt. Rev. John E. Mack

 - The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) is not under the authority of the Pope (Bishop) of Rome.
- The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) observes the seven sacraments, and they are as follows:
 - o 1. Baptism and Confirmation
 - 2. The Word of God
 - o 3. Penance
 - 0 4. Eucharist
 - o 5. Holy Unction (Anointing for Health)
 - o 6. Holy Orders
 - o 7. Matrimony
- All Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) sacraments are valid and licit.
- The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) clergy are permitted to marry.
