Readings for the Liturgy





Reflection

"This is my chosen Son; listen to him." (Luke 9:35). We often try to imagine what heaven is like. We sometimes picture heaven as a lush place with greenery, fruits, trees, and plants of various colors, smells, and textures. Some cinematic productions show heaven as the absolute epiphany of material desires. For example, in the cartoon "The Simpsons," separations between religions and denominations of the Christian faith are depicted, and each "heaven" is perfect for that belief and has all the materialistic components each person could ever want. If that is what heaven truly is, it sounds more like hell. In the gospel, Jesus takes Peter, James, and John, and he transfigures in their presence. He reveals God's mighty power and permits them to experience a bit of heaven. The disciples are left afraid, but they are not fearful in fear but are struck by unexplainable ecstasy that can only come from God's limitless wonder and majesty. God, The Father, even speaks to the disciples by telling them to listen to his son. (Luke 9:35) So where does this leave us? How can they experience a little bit of heaven like the disciples did on the mountaintop? We experience heaven every time we come to mass and actively participate. When we sing the hymns, respond with our prayers, receive the Eucharist, and overall, pray. Christ is revealed in all aspects of the Mass. He is revealed in the scriptures, the Eucharist, The Priest, and the congregation. We cannot yet handle the type of revelation shown at the transfiguration before Peter, James, and John. Still, through our observance and active participation in the Mass, we can see the transfigured Christ in all aspects of the Mass. We need to have faith and want to see it, or we can be naive like Peter, who only saw the abnormality of the ordinary and wanted to make tents for the three figures (Luke 9:33) and not the revelation of the divine. Some questions to reflect on this week:

- How do I see Christ in the Mass
 - Do I actively participate in the Mass by singing, responding, or greeting my other parishioners?

About The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC)

• The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) adopted a "Joint Declaration on Unity" with the Roman Catholic Church through which both bodies agreed to a limited communion arrangement.

• We are in Dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church

- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) permits <u>divorced people</u> to participate fully in the Mass and to receive the Eucharist. The church does not recognize civil divorce and requires an annulment before parishioners can remarry.
- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) is governed by its Constitution and Laws. The legislative authority of the Church is vested in the General Synod, the Special Synod, the Diocesan Synod, and the Parish Meeting. In financial and administrative matters, the Parishioners possess administrative authority. Representatives elected at the Annual Parish Meeting and confirmed by the Diocesan Bishop exercise their constitutional authority.

 - Prime Bishop: Rt. Rev. Anthony Mikovsky Diocesan Bishop of the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese: Rt. Rev. John E. Mack

 - The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) is not under the authority of the Pope (Bishop) of Rome.
- The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) observes the seven sacraments, and they are as follows:
 - o 1. Baptism and Confirmation
 - 2. The Word of God
 - o 3. Penance
 - 0 4. Eucharist
 - o 5. Holy Unction (Anointing for Health)
 - o 6. Holy Orders
 - o 7. Matrimony
- All Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) sacraments are valid and licit.
- The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) clergy are permitted to marry.
